


MRS MACULLUM'S WELCOME

Our reading ambassadors have been hard at work improving the library and it is has never been busier!

Last term, in Year 8 English Lessons, we were reading the award winning novel The Curious Incident of a Dog in the Night-Tme by Mark Haddon.

Students have been encouraged to buy their own copy of the book or to borrow one from the library, so we've had plenty of copies in stock and unsurprisingly this was the most checked out book this half term. We are also very grateful for those students who donated their old copies to the library once they had finished it.





OUR DIGITAL LIBRARY



Our digital library was launched earlier this year using the Sora app and has proved incredibly popular. In September all profiles were updated and all staff and students now have a new account.

If you have not set up your account yet, or are having trouble using the app, you can drop into our Sora Helpdesk in the library every lunchtime.

Users can also connect their Sora profile to their Norfolk library account, giving students access to an even wider range of titles. In the last year over 1,000 users have accessed over 14,700 books and have read for over 4,000 hours on the app.

How does it work? Students in Years 7 and 8 read a book, take an AR Quiz, and get immediate feedback. Students get excited and motivated when they see their progress and teachers can easily monitor and manage students' independent reading practice.

We use AR at Downham Market Academy to challenge students to earn points for quizzes and to aim to read a million words each year. Every 'Millionaire Milestone' is celebrated and all our 'Reading Millionaires' will receive a certificate and are entered into a prize draw at the end of the year and able to bask in their reading glory!

This year we have seen a number of library events. In February, to recognise Valentine's Day we ran a blind date with a book promotion to encourage reader to try a new genre or author. March saw our annual World Book Day celebrations and we also had our 'Drop Everything and Read' days. In June we had our reading picnics and a creative writing competitions.

Next year we will be continuing with our Drop Everything and read days on the 16th of every month. This date has been chosen specifically to the recognise the 16% of adults who are functionally illiterate in the UK and to try and reduce this for future generations.

February is the month of love and although St. Valentine was a Roman priest and physician who suffered martyrdom during the persecution of Christians by the emperor Claudius II Gothicus about 270, he is remembered as the patron saint of lovers.

Emperor Claudius II had banned marriage because he thought married men were bad soldiers. Valentine felt this was unfair, so he broke the rules and arranged marriages in secret. When Claudius found out, Valentine was thrown in jail and sentenced to death.

There, he fell in love with the jailer's daughter and when he was taken to be killed on 14 February he sent her a love letter signed "from your Valentine".


To celebrate, we introduced a blaind date with a book. Without judging a book by it cover and just taking the plunge, students selected a book from a brief description.






DMA BOOK WEEK
