<b>Worship</b>	<b>From worth-ship (that which you value the most), leading to the praise of God</b>
<b>Denominations</b>	<b>Different branches of Christianity that split from each other historically and have different beliefs and practices</b>
<b>Hajj</b>	<b>The Islamic pilgrimage to Mecca that each Muslim must</b>

<b>Wesak</b>	<b>The Buddhist festival that remembers the birth, enlightenment and death of Siddhartha Gautma (Buddha)</b>
